





# Dr Stan's Olive Corner - Number 4



### Extra virgin olive oil: the elixir for good health

Dr Stan advises for good health you need to eat 30ml or 2 tablespoonfuls of **extra virgin olive oil** each day 7 days a week together with plenty of fish, vegetables fruits and nuts. Extra virgin olive is magic because of its flavour, healthy fats and antioxidants other olive oils such as pure olive oil or light oil are not as good. If you are eating this amount of extra virgin olive already that is great. If you are eating other oils, margarine or butter, in addition to extra virgin olive oil you are likely to gain weight. You may or may not know, but most other food oils are extracted with chemicals and are highly processed. An oil that you should eat occasionally, for essential polyunsaturated fats and antioxidants, especially during fasting periods is *unhulled tahini* made from crushed sesame seeds.

You might say -I cannot eat that much olive oil each day. My uncle George drank two tablespoonfuls of straight extra virgin olive each morning to keep himself regular. Extra virgin olive oil is a good laxative but you do not have to resort to this. You can enjoy extra virgin olive oil (EVO) in many ways and consume enough to keep you in good health.

- Dip bread or toast into EVO
- Freeze EVO in the refrigerator and use instead of margarine or butter
- Use extra virgin olive oil for frying brithopites, egg plant, fish, chicken and lamb
- Brush EVO on lamb, beef, goat or chicken with lemon, herbs, salt, spices and herbs then roast
- Drizzle EVO over salads especially Greek salad; or over steamed vegetables
- Bake vegetables with EVO pumpkin, potatoes, capsicum, carrots with herbs and spices
- Drizzle EVO and orange juice over vanilla ice cream delicious!

The olive tree is one of the most symbolic plants in Greece and Kastellorizo. Dr Stan has walked all over our island and found olive trees in many places – Near St George of the Mountain, Barboutis' farm, Mandraki, behind the Hotel Kastellorizo, and on the way to the airport. The most notable olive tree is at the Acropolis. He estimates this tree is around 1000 years old. Obviously olive trees were growing and are still fruiting. Some trees have small olives probably due to lack of water whereas others are large and juicy maybe because they have tapped into a water stream.

Dr Stan spoke to some old Kazzies about the olives and it would appear that they were mainly used for table olives and any that fell on the ground, were eaten by goats and sheep. Most of the olive oil eaten by Kazzies came from elsewhere – Rhodes, other Greek Islands and Turkey. There are no remains of olive presses. Unlike grapes, olives cannot be crushed with the feet. Dr Stan was told that those that came back to Kastellorizo after the Second World War tried to make olive by grinding the olives to release the oil but were unsuccessful.

Olive oil is recognised for its beneficial claims because of its healthy fats and antioxidants. It is well recognised that Greeks that ate a Mediterranean diet that includes extra virgin olive as the main fat, but not baklava, strava or katoumari, had less heart disease and cancer problems especially breast cancer. On the whole persons who follow this diet have less blood cholesterol, reduced blood pressure, reduced risk of thrombosis as well as less metabolic problems such as obesity and diabetes.

It is safe to fry food in olive oil. Avoid buying cheap olive oils, as they may be old, rancid or even mixed with other oils. Check the date on the container and only buy extra virgin olive in dark bottles or cans. Fresh olive oil may be a little bitter, but that is a sign of freshness. Dr Stan says that olive oil from St John of the Mountain Monastery is an example of this. We all know that our first introduction to olive is at the Christening and the last exposure when the coffin is in the grave, but make sure that you eat plenty of extra virgin olive between these events.

### **BRIBIE ISLAND RETREAT AND RECREATION CENTRE**

Bribie Island, the only island of The Morton Bay Islands accessible by road, is just 45 minutes north from Brisbane Airport. The Island is a natural reserve and is protected, guaranteeing that over 80% of the environment will remain intact. Hundreds of species of birds visit each year as do the visiting dolphin, dugongs and turtles in the surrounding waters on both sides of the island.

When I heard that the Archdiocese had built a church on the Island, I promised myself on my next visit to Queensland to have a look. It was some years later but just recently had the opportunity to do just this. I was pleasantly surprised when we drove into the grounds of the retreat. The Chapel of Panagia Theotokos is built on an elevated level surrounded by bushland, on the right of the road as you approach the development and on the left as you come around the bend from the road is a granite carving on the ground.

The Chapel came about mainly due to the vision of a man from Limnos, Eleftherios Canellos known as Tom Lemnos. He had a vision to build a Monastery dedicated to the Panagia by the sea. When he died in May 1971 he left a large property overlooking Morton bay to the Archdiocese to fulfil his vision. The land was not suitable and the funds from the sale of the property were held in trust until a suitable area was found.

After years of planning, the land was found, and consists of 5 HA of native bushland just 100 metres from the sea. The first buildings were opened in the early 2000's, and have since progressed in stages, to what we have today.

The Chapel is similar in style to the Chapel at Prevelly, Margaret River. When I was showing the photos of the chapel to the committee, Jim Manifis, our past president, told us that his mother had donated all the Icons in the Chapel.

In a half circle pattern in front of the Chapel are 8 buildings that have accommodation for 48 people along with one of the first buildings, "Kastellorizio House," which is the home of the caretaker. This building was donated by The Kastellorizian Association of Queensland. The Community Centre can facilitate 250 people and is built in the middle of the accommodation buildings.

There is a calming and serene feel to the whole area and we spent several hours there.

It is well worth a visit if in the area, or a venue to remember for a retreat or a conference.

# **ELLIS CREEK - NEAR NANNUP WA**

During the writing of the story of my family migrating to Australia from Castellorizo back in the early 1990's I became interested in the background of my grandfather working down on the timber mills in the South West. He worked hard for four years down there to raise money to bring his family out to Australia. It was tough work and it subsequently led to his early death when my mother was only eleven years old. To obtain information I visited my mother, Aunty Cynthia Stavrianou, Mrs Helen Baster and Mrs Helen Macrides. They have now all passed on and I thought it appropriate that some of the little information I obtained be condensed into an article.

Part of my search for information led my wife and I to Nannup in 1995 where we attempted to locate the townsite of Ellis Creek. The area had dieback and it was with some persuasion that CALM agreed to supply us a map and directions. But it was an impossible search. So many firebreaks and various tracks caused us confusion and we aborted our search. Then in 1999 we became aware of an organised trip to Ellis Creek from Nannup, supervised by locals. There were about 30 of us in convoy and we arrived at what was the townsite. Most of the area had been reclaimed by the forest. We did however locate the cricket pitch and some pits where the men sawed the timber, one below and one on top. I recall some members of the Psaltis family there and there may have been other Greek families in the convoy. It was a very interesting experience.

My grandfather, Agapitos Spiros Karasavas, son of Spiro Karasavas and Maria (nee Malaxos), arrived in Western Australia alone on the 24th July 1924 ex the Italian Ship, *Moncalieri*. Agapitos had married Anastasia (nee Xanthis), the daughter of Zafiris Xanthis and Maria (nee Komninos), some twelve years earlier on the 26<sup>th</sup> February 1911 at Castellorizo. They had four children, Spiros, Zafiris, Maria (later Anastasakis) and Xanthi (Cynthia) (later Cresswell).

No doubt the earlier arrival to Western Australia by many of his countrymen had influenced his decision to come to this State. His wife's younger brother, Komninos Xanthis together with wife, Elefantiani (nee Kailis), the daughter of Palassis George Kailis and Maria (nee Kalaf), and children, were already in Perth and had advised him that he should come out to Australia. During 1924 Agapitos travelled down to the south west of Western Australia to seek work at the timber mills in Nannup. He was based at a settlement called Ellis Creek where other Greeks, including many Castellorizians, were employed. He later moved to Manjimup working both for the timber and tobacco industry. His aim was to raise sufficient funds to bring his family to Australia who waited patiently back in Castellorizo. He also wanted to assess the employment prospects in this new country, particularly for his two growing sons.

My mother commences the story......Dad was working on the mills at a place just out of Nannup, called Ellis Creek. He later went to work at another timber mill and also for a tobacco growing company down that way. Dad used to send over five pounds every month to my mother in Castellorizo. That was a lot of money in those days.

From Aunty Cynthia Stavrianou.......Dad and Uncle George Kailis ended up down at Ellis Creek, near Nannup. They were working on the timber mills and were timber cutting. The State Sawmills had just started up there. It was hard work but they saved money to enable the family to come out. In 1918 my mother and I, and my Kailis grandparents, came to Western Australia and we all went down to Ellis Creek. My Uncle Jack Kailis, also came with us from Castellorizo and went down to the timber mills. Prior to our arrival Uncle George had moved to the canefields in Queensland and when my grandparents arrived in Ellis Creek from Castellorizo they wanted him back, but he wouldn't come home. But my grandparents insisted that he come back to Western Australia and he then went to Ellis Creek.

And more from Aunty Cynthia......At Ellis Creek there was the State Government Sawmills. I can recall that a river ran by the settlement. It was deep and dad used to row across to get firewood from the other side. As well as my parents, uncles

and grandparents being at Ellis Creek other Cazzies there that I recall were Michael Kalaf, Malaxos (Max) Kalaf, Con Kalaf (who later had the Subiaco Bakery), Helen Nicholas (now Mrs Macrides) and her parents, the Phillips family and Helen Pitsonis (now Mrs Baster) and her parents. Helen Baster's mother died there so they came back to Perth. Her grandmother was a Kailis and grandfather a Kalaf. Years later Helen married a Cazzie who was at Ellis Creek, Michael Kalaf. Andrew Kalaf was his uncle but he wasn't at Ellis Creek. Andrew had sons, John, George and Komninos (Tom).

We lived in huts and I was only five years of age. We left to come to Perth in April and I was due to turn six in July. My grandmother had a stroke at Ellis Creek and was taken to Busselton, then Mum brought her to Perth. She looked like she was going to die so mum took a house in William Street - the house is still there, near Brisbane Street. Bill Lightly was the Manager at Ellis Creek. He had been very good to the Greeks chasing work down there.

The mill was near the River so they could use the water. The huts were next to the mill so the men could walk to work. Dad was working so he could make enough money to go back to Castellorizo to buy a shop. When living in Turkey he had a shop selling all sorts of materials. Mrs Nellie Macrides parents had a house. They had been there a long time before us. Her mother came up to Perth in 1916 and Helen was born at the markets. Then they went back to Ellis Creek. I was born the same year back in Castellorizo and we went to Ellis Creek in 1918. I don't remember the inside of her house but it had a double sided frontage and a white picket fence. There was only three of them in the house.

My Uncle Jack Kailis later bought a lot of the land down in Ellis Creek and they cleared the forest. It would have been in 1924 when Uncle Agapitos Karasavas came alone to Australia. He went down to Ellis Creek and also worked hard cutting timber. He left his wife and children behind. Agapitos was very good friends with both my Uncle George and Uncle Jack, and was loved by my parents. My grandmother became ill so we moved back to Perth and started a fish shop in Fitzgerald Street. Both my uncles later came up to Perth but Agapitos remained down at Nannup working to save money to bring out his family. He used to write regularly to my father and came up in 1926 so he could be godfather to my sister, Evelyn, who later married Michael Palassis.

None of the Castellorizian men at Nannup were used to the heavy labouring jobs and it was very hard work. All had come from jobs such as shop owners, traders and fishermen and had not worked on the land before. Agapitos saved his money then went back to Castellorizo and brought out his family in 1928.

From Mrs Helen Macrides......My parents arrived in Perth on Christmas Day 1915. The letter advising that they were coming was on the same ship so no one was there to meet them. My family lived in Wellington Street, right opposite Royal Perth Hospital with my aunty. Dad went down to Ellis Creek as mum was expecting me. I was born in Perth in 1916 and taken to Ellis Creek when I was a few months old. We stayed at Ellis Creek until 1923 when I was six years of age. My dad then bought a fish and chips shop in William Street, just near James Street. My father died in 1924 when I was seven years old.

We had a nice house on the street at Ellis Creek. Mum used to put me in a wheelbarrow and push me into the bush to pick up firewood to bring home. The others had huts over by the creek. Dad had dug a well and we had a big garden with mum planting and growing vegetables. Dad was working in the mill whilst the other men were out cutting timber. Mum used to sit at night picking splinters out of dad's hands. There was Dad, Mum and I at Ellis Creek but we did not have any other family there. I can recall the Kailis family, the Xanthis family and the Barboutis boys from Bunbury all being at Ellis Creek.

I remember Mum and I coming up to Perth to christen one of my aunties sons. We had to travel on the timber train to Nannup. We stayed overnight at Nannup then caught the passenger train to Perth. I was about five years old and was the interpreter as Mum couldn't speak English.

Dad died of pneumonia twelve months after arriving in Perth, and that was in 1924. He died within a week of taking ill. Mum said, "All that time in the bush and nothing happened". She sent him to the doctor when he became ill but he came home instead with a new hat, he didn't go to the doctor. Mum buried Dad with his new hat.

### Castellorizian Tribute to Lola Tsolakis

Contributing has been a way of life for Lola Tsolakis: to her family, her community and her heritage.

What does a little seven year old girl who came out to Australia in 1934 with her parents (Triantafilia and Kyriakos Simeon) and siblings from the Greek Island of Castellorizo learn about blending her Greek customs and traditions and shaping them to suit her adopted country of Australia? Firstly, she learns the English language at Highgate Primary School where so many other migrant children attended as this enabled her to integrate more effectively with the wider community. This is what Lola did in a shy and reticent way, because girls from Castellorizo were conditioned to be that way. Women's roles were more limited in the period that she grew up in the 1930's – 1950's. Roles were more clearly defined to marry, have children and support your husband who was the breadwinner. Her service to her family and committees, such as the Castellorizian Association of WA Women's Sub-Committee, the Castellorizian Ladies' Auxiliary and the Castellorizian Association of WA were part of that commitment to home and community.

The traditions that are significant in the Greek calendar and particularly the patron saints' day and other feast days that are celebrated on Castellorizo were deeply ingrained in her from childhood. This gave her the perfect platform to serve the Castellorizian Association of Western Australia in all its forms. She worked tirelessly to support many of the functions to commemorate Saints Constantine & Helene, Santrapeia Louka, Apokries, the annual children's Christmas Tree and New Year functions to bring the Castellorizian community together. It was important to maintain the Greek identity and traditions of her homeland in order to pass them down to the younger generations in a country that was becoming very multicultural, but also many Greeks were assimilating into the wider community. It was a link to their past that influenced their sense of identity.

Lola gave great support to her husband, Michael, who served on the Castellorizian Committee in his role as President from 1982 – 1984, Secretary and Editor of the Perth news for *Kastelloriziaka Nea* for a number of years.

It was at the time that Peter Georgis (1977-1982) served as President, and her husband, Michael, was Vice President, when the decision was made by the committee to purchase the home of the Castellorizian Association of WA in Mount Hawthorn. The committees worked very hard to raise money to pay the debt. Lola was one of the team whose work ethic was impeccable for the fundraising that was needed to manage the debt and to ensure that the new facility was fully operational for members to use.

Lola also served on the Committee of Management for two years from 1986-87 with Nick Nicholas as President and during this period the association celebrated its 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Lola worked with other committee members to ensure that it was a successful celebration.

Her loyalty, service, selflessness and dedication in preserving her heritage were much valued and acknowledged when she was made an Honorary Member of the Castellorizian Association of WA. This is a tribute to one of the women who played an important role in establishing the early foundations of the Mount Hawthorn function centre for the Castellorizian Association of WA.



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
