EULOGY - ATHENA (NINA) AUGUSTE

Athena Auguste April 29 1921 - March 31 2014

Athena Auguste was born on 29 April 1921 in Perth Western Australia. She was the youngest child of Arthur and Panaula Auguste. Her siblings were Evie, Marea, George, Dorothy, Tony, Helene, Denny and Gela.

Athena's father Arthur Auguste was the first Castellorizian to come to Australia in 1892.

As a young girl she worked with her sisters in the Oyster Beds, a family business that was a restaurant on the banks of the Swan River in Fremantle.

During the Second World War she served in the Australian Women's Air Force working as a Cypher. After WW2 she moved to Sydney where she trained as a triple certificate nursing sister at Sydney Hospital and Crown Street Women's Hospital in the early 1950's. She later became assistant secretary to the NSW Nurses' Association and became an active member in improving the conditions and wages of nurses.

During the 1960's she ran her own small business in Macleay St Potts Point with her sister Marea and brother in law Lazarus. After selling her business Athena became a Pharmaceutical Representative for many companies. She always said that she never applied for a job they always approached her.

Athena was an extremely hospitable person who loved life to the fullest. She travelled the world with her sisters and enjoyed entertaining her friends and family.

Athena loved all her nieces, nephews, great nieces and great nephews from Sydney, Queensland and Western Australia. Nothing was ever too much trouble to her and she was always there to offer a willing hand to whoever needed it.

Athena will be remembered as a generous, kind, strong willed independent lady with a mind of her own who always loved and had lots of time for her family and friends.

She passed away on March 31st 2014 and her funeral service was held at the South Chapel of the Eastern Suburbs Memorial Park, Military Road, Matraville on Friday, 4th of April 2014.

EULOGY - MARIA MATHEWS

Maria Mathews was born in Perth on 14 of January 1921. She was the second child and second daughter of Katína (neé Hatjimichilaki) and Kyriákos Kalafatás. Her elder sister was Rose and the children after her were – Chris, Thena, Anne (Eva), Hele and Nick – all born in Perth.

Although the family had help in the house at 45 Aberdeen St., Perth, particularly for the care of Kyriákos' mother Triantafiliá, Maria was the child in the family to attend to some of her personal needs. She tells the story of how she was the only one who would empty her grandmother's pot in the morning.

She went to Highgate Primary School, then Perth Girls. She was a bright girl at school and could have gone on to become a nurse (which she wanted to do) but because her family owned a newsagency under the Adelphi Hotel, the girls in the family were expected to assist in the shop. This Maria did, until she married in 1941 and left for Melbourne, Victoria where her husband Solon Anthony Mathews (Mathewdakis) was an engineer with the National Shipping and Transport Department.

Maria loved the excitement and freedom of Melbourne. She'd often tell us she felt free as a bird in this big city. The newly married couple lived in St Kilda and dined out almost every night for the first two years of their marriage. There are many stories to tell of the characters they met and the experiences they had during those years. Shortly after this Maria and Solon rented a two bedroom flat at 607 St Kilda Rd, where Lefki and Katherine were born.

In 1943 shortly after their first child Lefki was born, Solon enlisted in the Royal Australian Air Force soon to be posted to Port Moresby, New Guinea. Over the next couple of years the rent was paid but the flat was shut up and Maria and Lefki travelled between Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth. Maria's sister Rose lived with her family in Adelaide. It was considered safer there than amongst the US servicemen on leave and the uncertain atmosphere of a big city when the country was at war. In 1945 they spent about nine months in Perth where Maria's parents and a number of her siblings lived. Here, with relatives, family and the beach, life seemed particularly relaxed until Solon returned from the war and was quite quickly directed to move to Melbourne with his wife and family to be demobbed and released from military service.

On December 17 1947, Katherine Anne was born in Melbourne and two years' later on 22 February 1950 (in the same St Vincents' Maternity Hospital), Theodore John Anthony came into the world. By this time a house with a garden was required and the family moved to 1 Field St., in Caulfield.

In 1954, Solon, who was at this time an Engineer in the Lighthouse Service of Australia, was commissioned to design and oversee the installation of a telecommunications' beacon on Troughton Island on the furthermost northern tip of Western Australia. He was going to be away from the family for a year, so the decision was made for Maria and the children to move west and stay with her parents in Aberdeen Street in Perth.

When Solon had successfully completed this project, the children were comfortably installed in appropriate schools and another disruption to their education seemed unwise. As well as this his aunty Athena (neé Stilianopoulo) and Maria's uncle Manuel (Kalaf) owned and were running a well known restaurant called The Seacrest Restaurant in Cottesloe where the Indiana now stands and uncle Manuel persuaded Solon and Maria that the family's best interests would be served by staying and settling in Perth. They offered Solon a managerial position in the restaurant and the rental of the back section of their beautiful Federation homestead in Peppermint Grove. This was difficult to resist, especially as Maria and the children were eager to stay with the new life they'd made.

In 1956 when Solon decided to go to the US to see his mother - Lefkotheia (neé Stilianopoulo) and his brothers - Plato and Alexander - and sister - Clio, Maria returned to the Caulfield house at 1 Field St with her youngest child – Theodore - to pack everything up and sell the house. Meanwhile, the girls stayed in the care of aunty Athena and uncle Manuel back in Perth.

When Solon returned from his overseas travels, it was time to find a home of their own. Maria and Solon purchased their first and only Perth home - a small weatherboard house on the top of the hill at 128 Glyde Street Mosman Park about two kilometres from their uncle and aunt's Irvine St home. Later this house was demolished and the current hasienda was built in its place.

Maria and Solon had a great social life in Perth. Our families had holidays with the Nina and Spiro Michelides' and the Rene and Spiro Verios' families.

They enjoyed recreation card nights and at one stage they'd get dressed up in their Western outfits and go squaredancing. Maria enjoyed many annual holidays to Rottnest Island with Nina, Rene and Euharis Deutsch.

The children were busy studying - Lefki trained to be a librarian, Katherine studied art and design and Theo architecture - when Maria took a position at Albert's bookshop in Forrest Place, Perth. She was in the souvenir section of the store, enjoying the working life and excelling in the position when illness struck.

Sadly, only about eighteen months after she'd started working, Maria suffered a series of health crises - exophthalmic goitre and thyroid - then, Bell's Palsy. And freakishly (a one in 10 000 chance) Solon also caught the viral infection. After this the possibility of Maria going back to Albert's had passed.

On 19 December 1975 Solon senior died quite suddenly of an aneurysm. He lived to see his grandchildren - Anastasia, George and Solon born but sadly not his other grandchildren, Raman, Erin, Rosy and Maria. This was a terrible experience for Maria who was about to turn fifty-five.

As she came to terms with the grief of sudden loss, Maria instinctively opened her house to friends and relatives for gettogethers, overnight stays, dinners and so on. As a consequence her home was always full of people. Her siblings, children, nieces, nephews, grandchildren and friends all kept in touch with her, visiting and inviting her to all their parties and celebrations.

Katherine and Maria embarked on a few ventures together. They took over the bright Spot in High St., Fremantle and for a year or so ran a tearoom making the best hamburgers in the town, the best pea soup and the best home-make quiches. At this time they also dabbled in real estate.

For many years Maria hosted students from different countries, most of whom were in Australia to improve their English. These 'home-stays' were not the usual boarders, they were treated to meals, generous conversation and an invitation to meet the extended family. By the time they left for their respective countries each one was a valued friend that issued invitations for Maria to visit them in Sabah or Switzerland (which she followed up).

Travel was an important part of her life, with trips to the United States of America, all parts of Europe, Turkey and of course Switzerland and Malaysia. She travelled at different times with her friends Euxaris Deutsch, Zoi Orow grandchildren she made the journey to Kastellorizo, which was a wonderful family communion. In 2010 when she declared her overseas trips were over, Lefki and Katherine enticed her into a trip to Melbourne. It was a wonderful trip, including catching up with many nieces, nephews and family friends. She was 89 at the time.

Maria had a very close bond with her grandchildren. At the age of 92 she was capable of having a half hour conversation on the phone with them or with friends who rang for her. People who met her for the first time would always mention how much they loved her. She had a special magnetism that was born of her positive attitude, her art of engaging with whoever she was talking with and her not-to-be underestimated sense of humour.

There were a couple of old chestnuts she'd bring out at our Christmas dinners, and they were not always politically correct either!!!

One carer who came to be with mum over the past year, said to her on the way out after the first visit 'I love you Maria and I'm looking forward to coming back to be with you'. Maria, acerbically replied 'Love at first sight'.

She was a great reader of biographies and an aficionado on the Royal family, the Kennedys, Aristotle Onassis, Maria Callas - almost everybody. In fact in the last year we would read biographies to her and the background information she had on any personality was impressive. We recently read aloud the autobiography of Ray Martin the television host of the Midday Show and right through the readings she's pop up with 'I watched that programme', 'I remember how Pamela Stevenson embarrassed Ray that day'. Her mind was sharp and her memory clear.

Maria maintained her zest for life and her love and dedication to family. She was a great contributor to family, right to the end. She hated the fact that she was limited by her lack of mobility. She never let the loss of vision interfere with what had to be done. She was a strong, resourceful woman who has always kept her own home, maintained a beautiful, large spring garden, cooked appetising meals and kept counsel to all her family. She is widely read and well informed and thoughtful about current events. She is an inspiring role model for her entire extended family. Maria died peacefully on the morning of 5 April 2014.







GRAND OPENING OF THE ANDREW & MARINA PETRELIS AMPHITHEATRE MARCH 16th 2014







Dr Stan's Olive Corner - Number 5



Extra virgin olive oil: the elixir for good health

Dr Stan advises for good health you need to eat 30ml or 2 tablespoonfuls of **extra virgin olive oil** each day 7 days a week together with plenty of fish, vegetables fruits and nuts. Extra virgin olive is magic because of its flavour, healthy fats and antioxidants other olive oils such as pure olive oil or light oil are not as good. If you are eating this amount of extra virgin olive already that is great. If you are eating other oils, margarine or butter, in addition to extra virgin olive oil you are likely to gain weight. You may or may not know, but most other food oils are extracted with chemicals and are highly processed. An oil that you should eat occasionally, for essential polyunsaturated fats and antioxidants, especially during fasting periods is *unhulled tahini* made from crushed sesame seeds.

You might say -I cannot eat that much olive oil each day. My uncle George drank two tablespoonfuls of straight extra virgin olive each morning to keep himself regular. Extra virgin olive oil is a good laxative but you do not have to resort to this. You can enjoy extra virgin olive oil (EVO) in many ways and consume enough to keep you in good health.

- Dip bread or toast into EVO
- Freeze EVO in the refrigerator and use instead of margarine or butter
- Use extra virgin olive oil for frying brithopites, egg plant, fish, chicken and lamb
- Brush EVO on lamb, beef, goat or chicken with lemon, herbs, salt, spices and herbs then roast
- Drizzle EVO over salads especially Greek salad; or over steamed vegetables
- Bake vegetables with EVO pumpkin, potatoes, capsicum, carrots with herbs and spices
- Drizzle EVO and orange juice over vanilla ice cream delicious!

The olive tree is one of the most symbolic plants in Greece and Kastellorizo. Dr Stan has walked all over our island and found olive trees in many places – Near St George of the Mountain, Barboutis' farm, Mandraki, behind the Hotel Kastellorizo, and on the way to the airport. The most notable olive tree is at the Acropolis. He estimates this tree is around 1000 years old. Obviously olive trees were growing and are still fruiting. Some trees have small olives probably due to lack of water whereas others are large and juicy maybe because they have tapped into a water stream.

Dr Stan spoke to some old Kazzies about the olives and it would appear that they were mainly used for table olives and any that fell on the ground, were eaten by goats and sheep. Most of the olive oil eaten by Kazzies came from elsewhere – Rhodes, other Greek Islands and Turkey. There are no remains of olive presses. Unlike grapes, olives cannot be crushed with the feet. Dr Stan was told that those that came back to Kastellorizo after the Second World War tried to make olive by grinding the olives to release the oil but were unsuccessful.

Olive oil is recognised for its beneficial claims because of its healthy fats and antioxidants. It is well recognised that Greeks that ate a Mediterranean diet that includes extra virgin olive as the main fat, but not baklava, strava or katoumari, had less heart disease and cancer problems especially breast cancer. On the whole persons who follow this diet have less blood cholesterol, reduced blood pressure, reduced risk of thrombosis as well as less metabolic problems such as obesity and diabetes.

It is safe to fry food in olive oil. Avoid buying cheap olive oils, as they may be old, rancid or even mixed with other oils. Check the date on the container and only buy extra virgin olive in dark bottles or cans. Fresh olive oil may be a little bitter, but that is a sign of freshness. Dr Stan says that olive oil from St John of the Mountain Monastery is an example of this. We all know that our first introduction to olive is at the Christening and the last exposure when the coffin is in the grave, but make sure that you eat plenty of extra virgin olive between these events.

Julie passed away peacefully at home on Saturday evening 18 January 2014, aged 75 years, in the presence of her family. The daughter of Con and Evridiki Kalaf, both deceased, Julie Michael was born in 1938 in Perth where her father ran a business in the city. Along with her sister Iris, Julie commenced her education at St Brigid's Convent School in Perth before her family moved to Sydney, where they continued their education at Sydney Church of England Girls Grammar School (SCEGGS).

The family moved back to Perth, where Julie became a Dental Nurse at a city practice. She met Ken Michael in 1957 at an Hellenic Youth Association function and in 1964 they were married. They moved to London soon after, where Ken undertook postgraduate studies.

While in London, Julie worked in the Orthodontic Department of the Dental School at Guy's Hospital. In 1968 they returned to Perth after three and a half years in London when their children, Philippa and Justin, were both born.

At all times, and without exception, Julie gave her full support, despite the long period of illness she endured. She was a remarkable person, always placing others before herself.
