



NEW BOOK RELEASE

The long awaited seguel to *Greek Pioneers in WA* has now been released.

Odysseus in the Golden West: Greek Migration, Settlement and Adaptation in Western Australia since 1947 by Dr John Yiannakis, is available in soft cover, as well as a <u>limited</u> number of hard cover copies.

At 450 pages, this book is the most comprehensive account of the Greek presence in Western Australia in the postwar period.

CASTELLORIZIAN FAMILIES IN BRAZIL - PART ONE

Ioannis Georgios Christofis & Maria Apóstolos Komninos

Cristián Carranza is married to Maria Helena Constantino Spyrides and is Kyrana Constantino Spyrides' son-in-law

Ioannis Christofis was born in Castellorizo on September 6th 1907, the son of Georgios and Kyrá Christofis. He had two sisters, Panagiota and Izapeta (Izabel), and three brothers, Constantino, Diamantino and Christofis.

At the end of World War One and probably between 1918 and 1919, Diamantino and Christofis decided to run away from the war destruction. It was decided that Ioannis, the youngest of all the brothers at the age of eleven or twelve years of age, had to travel with them. Probably some time later, Panagiota, Izapeta and their mother, Kyrá, decided to travel to Brazil.

Somewhere in Australia, Ioannis worked as a waiter, so doing his part in assisting with the household expenses. Although it is not confirmed, the Christofis brothers in Australia received a letter from Kyrá, telling them that she and their sisters were now living in Brazil. That message was enough for Ioannis, who told his brothers about his intentions to see his mother and sisters again. He left Australia and made a stop in Italy. The only fact that survives from that time was that his surname was "latinized" during the migration process. He left Italy as Ioannis Cristóforo.

The ship travelled to Brazil and arrived at Paranaguá's Port, in Paraná State, southern Brazil. After finishing the migration procedure, his name had now become *João Cristóforo*. He finally met his mother and sisters and started to live with them in Curitiba City.

Sometime before 1931, Mrs Kyrá Christofis and children began to travel frequently to Florianópolis city to meet the flourishing Greek community started by Savvas Nicolau Savvas in about 1890. Probably on one of those trips, Mrs Kyrá Christofis found a "perfect match" for her son João. The lucky woman was Maria Apóstolos Komninos, daughter of Apóstolos Kosmos Komninos and Evdoquia Atherinou, born in Castellorizo like her eight brothers and sisters. Apóstolos and his family had travelled from Castellorizo to Brazil in 1924.

João went to Florianópolis to meet his future wife (yes, Mrs Kyrá, Apóstolos and Evdoquia had arranged everything and Maria and João were the last ones to know... like the old times...)

They married in 1931. It was a golden opportunity for them, because the orthodox priest had just arrived from Greece in order take responsibility of St Nicolas Orthodox Church of Florianópolis.

Once married, João returned with Maria to Curitiba. At 628 Alameda Dom Pedro II Street, João built the "João Cristóforo General Store", at the side of his home in Batel neighborhood. Everything was done to help start a prosperous home life with Maria.

On December 26th of 1934, they were blessed with a daughter, Kyrana Cristóforo, named after João´s mother, following the Greek tradition.

João and Maria spent all their life in Curitiba, occasionally travelling to Florianópolis. The photo below shows João and Pantaleão Fermanis enjoying a couple beers at Pantaleão's bar. Pantaleão was João's brother-in-law (married to one of Maria's sisters, Kyrana).

João passed away at the age of 52 years, from lung cancer which was a consequence of his accentuated smoking habit.

Maria spent the remaining days of her life in Rio de Janeiro with her daughter, Kyrana, and grandchildren, and died in March 19th 1990. She was 81 years old.

Australian Friends of Kastellorizo was delighted with the response to the Art Sale & Exhibition in Perth & would like to thank the West Australian Castellorizian Association for its support by providing the venue.

Up to 200 people attended the Perth Exhibition with Dr Norman Ashton opening the occasion. As many of you know Dr Ashton conducted an archaeological survey of Kastellorizo and published his results in 1995 in *Ancient Megisti: the Forgotten Kastellorizo*. Eleven paintings were sold on the day which adds to the 6 that were sold on eBay. Dr Platon Alexiou , the artist from Athens, was present to talk to people about his art. The artwork was then exhibited in Sydney with John Mangos as the MC. Art not sold in Australia is being exhibited in Kastellorizo at the moment and available for sale at the Megisti Hotel.

Work has begun in sequencing the order of the paintings that will be used from this collection of artworks in the production of the illustrated children's history book that AFK hopes to release later this year. The draft of the text to accompany the images is very much in the preliminary stages at the moment.

Heading home after visiting Byron and Valerie Kakulas's house, which is under renovation, we freshened up for our evening meal to be held at Komninos and Lola's restaurant where an Athens based Greek singer will be performing during our meal. Arriving about 7.00pm we were glad we had booked as there was quite a crowd at the restaurant.

My cousin, Elizabeth, from Adelaide and her family were there as were many other faces we had got to know over the last few days on Castellorizo.

I then saw Con Venouts os who I had met some years ago in Perth and he introduced me to his wife, Despa (nee Manifis). The singing and dancing went well into the night and Elizabeth, Despa and others entertained everyone as they danced to the music. Sitting back and sipping on my red wine as food came in various dishes I pondered over how wonderful this all was. A beautiful still evening and we were relaxed and enjoying ourselves immensely. This is true Mediterranean lifestyle at its best.

When the singer had a break she came over to our table and had a long conversation with us. At the end of the conversation she told us that she was a Castellorizian and came over every year from Athens. "You will come again next year and I will see you again?" she inquires. But it was more like a

demand of me than a question. I just nodded my head as she gives me a peck on the cheek. What a great evening was had by all.

Later we have a siesta and I wait patiently for the arrival of Nick Zounis, Tony Bellos and Leffie Gelavis who are flying in to Castellorizo. They arrive down the hill from the airport by bus late in the afternoon. I am waiting to greet them. Tony is out of the bus first. "Welcome to Castellorizo", I say to him. He is stunned! "What are you doing here?", he asks. "Same as you", I reply. "You are black!" he exclaims. Until then I hadn't realised that I was sporting a great two week plus suntan compliments of Turkey, Rhodes and Castellorizo.

The day has been a beautiful one and the empty harbour soon fills with many yachts and launches, some worth millions. Yesterday the harbour was empty and now it is packed full of boats and people.

CAZZIE MILITARY HEROES







Agapitos (Jack)
MICHAEL
11th Battalion
3rd Brigade

Agapitos (Jack) Michael was born in Castellorizo on December 4th 1883 to Michael Agapitos Hatzimarkou (Michael) and Eudocia (nee Passaris). His siblings were Constantine, George and Maria. Around 1896 he travelled to Australia with his uncle, Kyriakos Passaris, and worked in the Western Australian goldfields. He later ran a store at Cue. On October 6th 1905 at Melbourne Jack became a naturalised Australian citizen

Jack enlisted on November 17th 1916 to do service for his adopted country in World War One. He was assigned Service Number 7283 and commenced military training at Blackboy Hill in Midland. Jack was assigned to the 11th Battalion A.I.F. which embarked for Europe from Fremantle on January 29th 1917. They departed on the *HMAT Miltiades*, a British Steamer being used as a Troop Transport Ship. Jack would have appreciated the name of the ship, named after the famous Greek General who overcame the Persian invasion of Athens during the days of the famous 'Marathon' story.

After arriving at Devonport England on March 27th 1917 Jack contracted the Mumps which required hospitalisation. He later embarked for France on July 9th 1917 from Southampton.

Jack was wounded on a raid near Ypres and admitted to hospital in France on October 6th 1917, suffering with pleurisy. On his recovery he was sent back to the front and during battle he sustained an ankle wound at the Somme in August 1918.

When the armistice came on the November 11th 1918 Jack was in Paris. There he was granted fourteen days leave, returning to England for further leave in February 1919. The 11th Battalion finally departing France for England on April 21st 1919. On his return home to Perth, Jack was honourably discharged on December 25th 1919. His health was impaired with the effects of mustard gas and he suffered with ongoing health problems for the rest of his life. Jack was a real life surviving hero of World War One!

Jack married Ourania Antonios Zempilas at Perth in 1921 and commenced to raise a family. Between 1922 and 1930, Michael, Anthony, Eudocia, Anastasia and Marcus were born. Then tragedy struck the family when their mother, Ourania, died on August 8th 1932, at 98 Lake Street Perth. Five young children under ten years of age without a mother.

In 1935 Panagiota Zafiri arrived in Perth from Castellorizo and that same year married Jack Michael. She took on the responsibility of raising these five young children as her own. In addition, Panagiota gave birth to three more children, Con, Komninos (Ken) and Rose.

Jack died at Perth on June 9th 1946 aged 63 years. He suffered for nearly twenty years from the effects of the war. His wife, Panagiota, was left to raise eight children, with three still under the age of ten years.

Jack never had a chance to experience and appreciate the successes and achievements of his family in the years to come. Panagiota died a justifiably proud mother of eight children on June 17th 2002.

MICHAEL MALAXOS TSOLAKIS

Michael Malaxos Tsolakis was born in Castellorizo on October 22nd 1921. Michael was the third born son of eight children to Malaxos Tsolakis and Maria (nee Papalazaros). His siblings were Panayiotis, Marou (Mrs Georgis), Dialekti (Mrs Scopelitis), Despina (Mrs Sertis), Triantafillo (Mrs Kailis), Diomataris and Anastasis. He celebrates his eighty eighth birthday this year and is to be congratulated for being awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) on June 8th 2009.

Michael left Castellorizo so he could attend high school in Athens, living with his uncle and aunt who were childless. At 16 year of age it was decided he should move to Australia to live with his married sister who lived in Kalgoorlie. He arrived in Australia per the ship, *Esquilino*, on February 8th 1938. Michael's first ambition was to become fluent in English and he taught himself to become so.

Michael completed an apprenticeship in tailoring and later opened his own business in Perth which he ran for many years before retiring at 65 years of age. Michael had married Lola Simeon at Perth in 1948. He had previously completed military service during World War Two after enlisting at Boulder on June 8th 1942 and was discharged on December 4th 1945 at the rank of corporal. Michael and Lola raised a family of three children.

From 1945 right up to his retirement in 1986 Michael volunteered his services as an interpreter for any Greek persons requiring assistance. Whether it was assisting at hospitals, at appointments, in obtaining employment, or in translating documents, Michael was always there to help the Greek migrant. During these years many post war Greek migrants came alone to the country and without family support. Michael was there to assist in their assimilation by bridging the language barriers for them.

When Michael retired from tailoring in 1986, and at 65 years of age, he trained as an interpreter at TAFE and gained accreditation after a two year course. With this official accreditation Michael could then work as a translator at Centrelink, Criminal Court Trials, Family Law Court, Royal Perth Hospital, Police Stations and as a telephone interpreter in times of emergencies.

Michael was appointed the official Greek interpreter for the Greek Water Polo Team at the Sydney Olympics in 2000 which was a most exciting assignment for him.

In 2008 Michael had amassed more than 20 years as an official accredited interpreter on top of his 42 years as a volunteer interpreter prior to retiring as a Tailor.

Michael was a founding committee member of the Floreat Athena Soccer Club; Life Member, Secretary and Trustee of the Hellenic Community of WA; Castellorizian Association of WA President (1982-1984), Secretary and an Honorary President of that association.

Michael we salute you for your longstanding services and commitment to the Greek Community.
